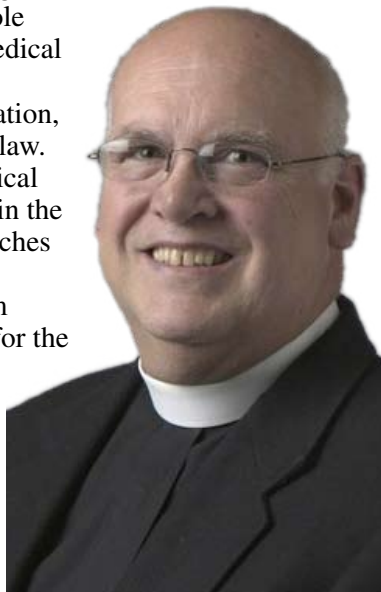

## Introducing John Johanssen

In February, Bishop Thomas Breidenthal named Canon John Johanssen priest-in-charge at Christ Church Cathedral. He is to fill this role while Dean James Diamond is on medical leave, recovering from illness.

John holds degrees in music education, higher education administration and law. He graduated from Virginia Theological Seminary in 1990 and was ordained in the Diocese of Ohio. He has served churches in Ohio, Wisconsin and Colorado. In 2008, Bishop Breidenthal named him canon for congregational formation for the Diocese of Southern Ohio. He now serves as canon to the ordinary for the diocese.

John and his wife, Pam, have four sons and nine grandchildren.



## King Legacy Award

## New Homeless Assistance Program

Christ Church Cathedral has taken a concrete step forward to help men and women who are homeless or otherwise in need move closer to achieving a life of stability. The cathedral has hired a professional outreach worker to staff its new homeless assistance program.

Cornelius Spikes, working through a contract that the cathedral has made with the FreestoreFoodbank, coordinates services and provides support for those seeking assistance and those wishing to volunteer to help. Volunteer friends are a key component of this pilot program.

Volunteer friends are those who desire greater involvement in assisting those who are homeless or otherwise in need. Initially, volunteer friends are helping those in need secure the necessary personal identification, such as birth certificates or driver's licenses,

that is a prerequisite for qualifying for government assistance and subsidized housing. Cornelius will provide training and assistance in helping volunteer friends carry out



their ministry. Cathedral clergy will work with the volunteers to help them understand and nurture the spiritual base for serving those who lives are deeply troubled.

"This is a pilot effort which means we expect to gain greater

understanding and knowledge of what works and what doesn't as the program unfolds," says Pat Coyle, a member of the program's advisory committee. As a work in progress, the committee anticipates making program modifications through the year, the time span for the pilot.

## 2010 Lenten Series

### Deep Christianity: Where manger and cross collide

In Christ Church Cathedral's *Deep Christianity: Where manger and cross collide*, its 2010 Lenten series, presenters are exploring the presence of God in a broken and hurting world. It is easy to find love and faith in the manger. How can we sustain that love and faith when they collide with the destructive pain of the cross? The answers form the foundation of a deep Christianity that holds up against the life challenges that would wither a more comfortable but shallow spirituality.

The series is being offered over the five Wednesdays in Lent. The evenings begin at 6:00 p.m. with a Taizé prayer service. A dinner follows at 6:30. The program begins at 7:15. Canon Rick Cross set the tone for the series with an introductory presentation on February 24. The speakers and their topics in the subsequent weeks follow.

**March 3 & 10:** "The Message of Hope in the Book of Revelation." In these two sessions, the Rev. Barbara Rossing will explore the topic from her interest in the Book of

Revelation, apocalypse, eschatology (end times) and ecology. She is an ordained Lutheran minister and professor of New Testament at the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago. She is known for her widely-acclaimed book *The Rapture Exposed: The Message of Hope in the Book of Revelation*.

**March 17:** "Deep Christianity." In this session, the Rev. Damon Lynch, Jr., will explore the role of the prophetic voice in a hurting world, and the ways in which we are called to speak in God's name in times of trouble, sorrow or oppression. He is the pastor of New Jerusalem Baptist Church, a founding member of the board of directors of the National Underground Freedom Center and a strong advocate for social justice in the city of Cincinnati.

**March 24:** "Love at the Cross." Dean James Diamond is scheduled to lead this last session on how love and faith can be sustained in the midst of personal devastation. If the Dean is unable to present this program, Canon John Johanssen will do so in his place.

## *Pastoral Care: You Can Make a Difference*

Pastoral care can be a challenge in the widespread community of Christ Church Cathedral, but the good news is that opportunities for members to minister to one another in meaningful ways have increased. Now anyone concerned about pastoral care can easily become involved.

The cathedral's pastoral care ministry (also known as LAMS – Lay Associates for Ministry and Service) has been reorganized for easier lay participation. The group is now focused on three key areas of pastoral service: 1) providing food for those recovering from surgery or a serious illness; 2) sending cards of encouragement and caring; and 3) providing transportation to older members and others unable to drive. Another important function of the ministry is planning and hosting luncheons twice a year for the cathedral's senior members. These events involve a service in the chapel, followed by food, fellowship and fun – and plenty of smiles!

The aim of all these activities is to live out the cathedral vision that “We, as a parish family, nurture, love and minister to one another in both our spiritual and pastoral needs.” Please give prayerful thought to pastoral service and how you may be able to participate. Celebrate each other's success. Extend these attitudes and emotions to the larger community. The key for people is connectivity.

## Pieces of Life by the Rev. Canon Nancy Turner Jones

Recently a favorite uncle of mine passed away, and my husband and I have the privilege of sifting and sorting through the home he shared with my aunt for over thirty-five years. It is all there, dusty photographs and tarnished silver, stacks of papers, and the many tools of a farm boy grown old who outlived his spouse by nearly two decades. Anyone who has cleaned out a house of a beloved family member knows the labor and emotional toll. Yet there is joy in finding treasures, pieces of life that transport you back in an instant to a different time, a different age. And I found so many!

My aunt's binoculars for bird watching still sat on the windowsill. Her needlepoint hung on the wall next to the bookcase filled with well-used Bible commentaries, her preparation for teaching Sunday school. And her mother, my grandmother, was also present – in the braided rug on the floor and the vase that once sat on her dining room table. I even found my grandmother in her youth in the smiling eyes of the confirmation picture in the attic.

I thought a lot about these wonderful women who loved me and nurtured me. I thought a lot about their lives and how different they were from my own. I thought once again about the conversation with my grandmother not long before she died. She wanted to be a teacher, but that was made impossible because of the time in which she was born and the circumstances of her life. She was the oldest daughter of a Lutheran pastor, charged with the care of five younger siblings after her mother passed away. She helped to send her brothers to college and eventually to seminary.

She admitted to me that day how hard it was to watch her brothers go off to school while she did what was expected of a daughter, to take care of the family.

A few months ago I read a book by New York Times columnist Gail Collins entitled *When Everything Changed: The Amazing Journey of American Women from 1960 to the Present*. Collins writes what changes in the law and in society have meant for women; how expectations in law and medicine, and opportunities found in Title IX and equal pay for equal work, have transformed the way women live. My husband and I appreciated the book so much that we purchased one for each of our daughters and daughters-in-law. Why? Because we wanted them to know of the lives of the women who came before them and on whose shoulders they stand. I don't want them to forget that women didn't always have choices.

I doubt that my grandmother ever dreamed that her granddaughter would have been given the opportunity to attend seminary, much less teach in one. Or that she could have answered the call to ministry as a pastor and a priest. As women, we must support one another, in faith and in community, connecting our pieces of life, our hearts, the gifts of our calling as Christian women in the world.

This month is Women's Month at Christ Church Cathedral. I look forward to celebrating with the congregation, particularly the women, the accomplishments of the women who have done so much for our church. Thanks be to God!
