## BUILDING an ETHICAL ECONOMY: theology & the MARKETPLACE

With unprecedented economic challenges all around us, what role does theology have in defining a new economy? The Trinity Institute's 2010 national theological conference, *Building an Ethical Economy: Theology & the Marketplace*, will explore some answers, as theologians and economists talk about the relationship between economics and Christian belief and action.

Christ Church Cathedral is presenting a webcast presentation of the conference on Wednesday through Friday, January 27-29.

Speakers will include: Dr. Rowan Williams, archbishop of Canterbury; Dr. Partha Dasgupta, professor of economics, University of Cambridge; Dr. Kathryn Tanner, professor of theology, University of Chicago Divinity School; and the Most Rev. Bernard Ntahoturi, archbishop of Burundi. They will discuss why financial systems sometimes become belief systems rather than neutral mechanisms for exchange; offer constructive alternatives to present models of economics and consumerism; and envision ways to build an economy that is both ethical and just.

The conference will include presentations by each speaker, followed by responses from the other speakers and questions from the audience. Interactive reflection groups throughout the conference will provide participants with time to discuss what has been said and to share their own thoughts and experiences.

"We are pleased to be able to offer this special webcast presentation of the Trinity Institute at the cathedral each year," says Canon Joanna Leiserson. "This year, in particular, I think it is important to consider the moral perspective that led to an economic morass which left few untouched. We need to take this opportunity to envision a more ethical and sustainable economy for all humanity."

As a gift to the city of Cincinnati and the surrounding areas, there will be no fee to participate in the Trinity Institute at the cathedral. ## FROM THE DEAN

This is a short message of greetings to you for a blessed New Year.

As we enter the final six months of my tenure as dean, I want to do some deliberate looking back over the years so that we have a sense of what we were like in 1999 compared with 2010 and how we have traveled to who and what we are as a cathedral today.

I have invited several of the canons who served with me to come back for a Sunday to preach and visit with us. Linda Bartholomew will come at the end of January; Kwasi Thornell will join us in mid-February; Anne Wrider will come in March and Wes Hinton will be with us in late April or early May. These will be occasions of reminiscence and learning for us all.

I have also talked with Pat Coyle, who chaired the search committee that brought me here. He is willing to engage in a conversation with me about that search committee and what our separate experiences were at that time. We will have that conversation in a Sunday morning forum in the early spring.

There will be a number of other events culminating in my final Sunday, June 27. In the meantime, our wardens will report on the transition process as part of our annual meeting on February 7. I would be happy to hear from you about suggestions for how to conclude our time together, including celebrating these years and saying good-bye.

## A TIME OF TRANSITION

Following Dean James Diamond's retirement at the end of June, 2010, we at Christ Church Cathedral will begin a process of change to bring a new dean to the congregation sometime in 2011.

***What will happen during this transition time, and how are we as a vestry body and a cathedral community preparing for it?***

Many meetings have already taken place within the vestry, which is acting as the transition team. Beginning last July, the transition team started meeting bi-weekly to put a timetable together. Since then, we have met with the Dean and other cathedral clergy and staff, as well as the Bishop and Canon John Johanson, the diocesan deployment officer, in intricate discussions on the process involved, the criteria needed for an interim dean, a cathedral profile, the

search process, assessment and discernment. ***What is needed now is input from the congregation.***

The first of several forums will occur on Sunday, February 7, at the annual meeting, which will begin after the 10:00 a.m. liturgy. Following the elections, the main focus of the agenda will be the transition process. A power point presentation will bring members up-to-date as to where the cathedral is today and where the congregation must go during the discernment period. A question and answer session will follow the presentation. ***It is important for members to attend this meeting.***

## Foyer Groups

Foyer Groups are thriving at Christ Church Cathedral. These "porches of welcome" are small groups of members and friends of the congregation. Each group of 10 to 15 adults usually meets monthly, but can meet at other times as well, as the group decides. A group could meet for a meal, either provided by the host or by potluck, or for an event, lasting for about two hours. Some groups build their get-togethers around discussion topics; others are purely social.

Last January, 39 members formed five groups to enjoy 28 meals, a picnic and bowling. By the end of the year, the groups claimed 51 members, meeting in one another's homes or at some other location.

Foyer Groups were developed by the Community of the Cross of Nails, an international organization established by England's Coventry Cathedral to promote reconciliation among all peoples. Christ Church Cathedral's affiliation with Coventry Cathedral and CCN is nurtured, in part, through Foyer Groups.

Any adult is welcome to join a Foyer Group. Being able to host a group in one's home is not a requirement.

Members find their time together enlightening and enriching, as well as a way to establish new friendships and deepen existing ones.

### SENIOR WARDEN NOMINEE

## SHINGLES

*What is it? Who is at risk?*

Shingles occurs when the virus that causes chicken pox once again becomes active. It can affect someone without warning. Symptoms such as itching, tingling or burning are often felt before they are seen. Blisters will develop within a few days. Shingles can be very painful, and may take four weeks to heal. Long term effects may include infection, muscle weakness and scarring and decrease in vision or hearing. As one ages, the risk increases. There is now a vaccine available for those at risk.
